

Final exam 1998 - Solutions

1

(a) $\phi \equiv n \omega$ (scalar) [≡] $\#/\text{cm}^2 \text{ sec}$

$\mathcal{J} \equiv n \underline{\omega}$ (vector) [≡] $\#/\text{cm}^2 \text{ sec}$.

(b) critical is $K=1$ or $\rho=0$, ie steady state flux where births = deaths.

prompt critical is when the reactor is critical on prompt neutrons only, ie in the point kinetics eqn:

$$\frac{dn}{dt} = \rho - \beta n + \sum_i \lambda_i \Sigma_i$$

$\rho = \beta$. Thus reactor is supercritical due to excess delayed neutrons. When $\rho \approx \beta$, $\frac{dn}{dt}$ increases with a short time constant (~ 1).

(c) $\Sigma_s(E_1 \rightarrow E_2)$ is scattering from group 1 to group 2.
 $\Sigma_s(E_2 \rightarrow E_1)$ " " up " " 2 " 1.

$$(d) \eta = \frac{\sum_f^{\text{fuel}}}{\sum_a^{\text{fuel}}} , \quad f = \frac{\sum_f^{\text{fuel}}}{\sum_a^{\text{fuel}} + \text{all else}}$$

$= \frac{\# \text{ of fission neutrons produced}}{\text{abs. in fuel}} \quad \equiv \text{thermal utilization}$



$= \frac{\text{Production rate}}{\text{Loss rate}}$

2 (cont'd)

- ① If have 1000 fast neutrons & 2.4331 fast are produced for every thermal fission, then must have $\frac{1000}{2.4331}$ thermal fissions
- ② Add 25 fast neutrons due to fast fission.
- ③ Need $\frac{411}{14835}$ thermal neutrons abs. in fuel if only 0.4835 (as a fraction) lead to fission.
 $= 850$
- ④ 50 lost in non-fuel abs. \therefore must have had $850 + 50 = 900$ thermals.
- ⑤ Further 20 thermal leak \therefore must have had $920 (= 900 + 20)$ before that.
- ⑥ 100 non-thermals are abs. \therefore must have had 1020 before that less.
- ⑦ Deduce that 5 must have leaked out as fast neutrons.

Absorption rate at $x = \sum_a \phi(x)$



b) With absorber (which doesn't displace volume)

$$\therefore \Sigma_{\text{abs}} = -10\pi^2 \left[\frac{2}{100^2} + \frac{1}{H^2} \right] + 0.0296$$

$$= -0.0279 + 0.0296$$

$$\boxed{\Sigma_{\text{abs}} = 0.0017 \text{ cm}^{-1}}$$

$$\begin{array}{ll} \text{2-group: } & \chi_1 = 1 \quad \sum_{S_{21}} = 0 \quad (\text{no upscatter}) \\ & \chi_2 = 0 \quad \text{Homogeneous.} \quad \sum_{f_1} \approx 0 \end{array}$$

\therefore in steady state:

$$-D_1 \frac{\partial^2 \phi_1}{\partial x^2} + \sum_{R_1} \phi_1 = \nu_2 \sum_{f_2} \phi_2$$

$$-D_2 \frac{\partial^2 \phi_2}{\partial x^2} + \sum_{a_2} \phi_2 = \sum_{S_{12}} \phi_1$$

For bare reactor, ϕ_1 & ϕ_2 have same shape (cosine)

Usual B.C.: $\phi(\pm a_2) = 0$ (at extrapolated distance)



d) Plugging in to flux equations of (a):

$$\nabla \cdot \frac{\partial \phi_1^0}{\partial t} = \nabla \cdot D_1 \phi_1 - \sum_{R_1} \phi_1 + (1-\beta) \nu_2 \sum_{f_2} \phi_2 + \sum_{i=1}^6 \frac{\lambda_i \beta_i \nu_2 \sum_{f_2} \phi_2}{\lambda_i}$$

$$= \nabla \cdot D_1 \phi_1 - \sum_{R_1} \phi_1 + \nu_2 \sum_{f_2} \phi_2$$

$$\text{since } \beta = \sum_{i=1}^6 \beta_i$$

$$\nabla \cdot \frac{\partial \phi_2^0}{\partial t} = \nabla \cdot D_2 \nabla \phi_2 - \sum_{R_2} \phi_2 + \sum_{S_{12}} \phi_1 \quad (\text{unchanged from before})$$

e) The S.S. fudge factor was only introduced as a means of artificially finding that particular combination of variables that precisely balanced the neutron gains and losses. The term in the flux equation that was most uncertain and affected the balance significantly was the $\nu \sum_f \phi$ term. Hence the term was fudged to $\nu \sum_f \phi$ and K was adjusted to give criticality. We could have adjusted Σ_a just as easily.

For the transient, we want to track the dynamic response to perturbations, controller actions and the like as poison grows in, etc. So it is best to use a realistic controller that mimics the actual control rods.
